Development Hearing

A Continuation of the Second (2) Reading of April 10, 2006

June 12, 2006

At 7PM in the Watch Lake Community Hall

(located 2.2 k from Watch Lake Lodge at Watch Lake Rd and Little Green Lake Rd)

Application by Kolodinski for rezoning Bylaw No. 4125 Lot 1, District Lot 3891, Lillooet District, Plan 38531, from Rural 1 (RR1) zone to Lakeshore Residential 2 (RL-2) zone for the purpose to create an eleven (11) lot residential subdivision located at 6454 Livingston Road at the North end of Green Lake.

Previous applications made a number of years ago had been rejected due to concerns regarding water levels, lakeshore protection of marsh areas, and ecological preservation. These concerns have not changed.

GLARA suggests no such applications be passed until an Official Community Plan is in place to guide the growth of the community and respectfully protect the lakeshore, marshes, birds, and wildlife that balance our ecology and pristine environment in the 70 Mile, Green Lake, Watch Lake area.

GLARA encourages all residents to attend this meeting!


PRESIDENTS'S MESSAGE

WATER REPORT

This year the first water test was conducted on Green Lake on May 20th. Water samples were taken to test only temperatures and PH levels. The Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection has determined that Green Lake and Watch Lake have remained stable for the past few years and testing for Nitrogen and Phosphorous will be on hold for at least one year. Lac De Roche Lake and Heffley Lake have begun testing for these items.

On Green Lake the temperature at 24 M was 2° C. This is the lowest recording for this depth. Previous readings were 4° C. At 12 M the temperature was 4° C and at .5 M the temperature was 7° C. pH levels were 9 for all three depths. In addition, water clarity was also tested. The depth of clarity was 9.5 M. These tests will be conducted every two weeks till the end of summer.

The ice was off Watch Lake on April 19th. Norm Rastad and Ralph Cole continue to measure and record temperatures and pH levels at the three depths for Watch Lake. To date data remains consistent.

Green and Watch Lakes may well be two of the most beautiful and critical lakes in the Cariboo. Those of us who live and play here must all share the responsibility for ensuring these lakes remain pristine and a healthy environment for fish, waterfowl, insects, animals, and people! These are some tips on how to keep Green and Watch Lakes healthy. The BC Lake Stewardship Society and the Provincial Government Ministry of Water, Land and Air Protection developed the following guidelines:

- 1. Minimize the disturbance of shoreline areas by maintaining natural vegetation cover.
- Replant lakeside grassed areas with native vegetation.
- 3. Do not import lakeside fine fill.
- Do not use fertilizers in areas where the potential for water contamination is high, such as sandy soil, steep slopes, or compacted soils.
- Do not apply fertilizers or pesticides before or during periods of rainfall, due to the likelihood of runoff into the water system.
- Have your septic tank pumped out every 2 to 5 years by a septic service company. This will help
 extend the life of your field, ensure it is functioning properly, and minimize the possibility of leeching
 of septic water into the lake.
- Use phosphate free soaps and detergents.
- 8. Refrain from dumping chemicals down your drains, as they can kill the bacteria that make your septic system work!
- 9. When boating, never throw trash, cans, bottles, or unused food overboard.
- 10. Never use the lake as a toilet!
- Never use the lake as a bathtub! the soap you introduce to the water remains for years, along with any other foreign bodies you may deposit there.
- 12. Fill gasoline containers where any overspill will not contaminate the lake water. Gasoline, especially mixed fuel, spreads over the water surface and prevents insects from hatching, pollutes waterfowl, and eventually can have a negative permanent impact on the lake water and bottom sediment.

NEW SIGNS

Two of our new GLARA signs are now up! One is at the junction of 83 Mile Road and North Green Lake Road, the other at the junction of Watch Lake Road on Pioneer Lane at Banks Road. And boy is Ol'Yardley ever looking good!

The OCP Committee has been working diligently with the CRD, TNRD, and Urban Systems to prepare a survey that will provide additional information regarding interests, issues, and concerns relevant to our lakes and area. This tool asks pertinent questions that will help and support the OCP Committee and the regional players to develop an accurate picture to build on in designing an Official Community Plan for the 70 Mile, Green Lake, Watch Lake area.

Community planning protects and provides for what people and residents see as priorities in maintaining a healthy lifestyle, symbiotically with the natural environment.

Please, when you receive your copy of the survey take time to read it thoroughly and answer the questions as best you can. It is not just our future – it is the future of our heirs, the children of BC, and all nature that abounds in this region.

GRASSLANDS - A THREATENED ECOLOGY

Grasslands are an essential part of our local ecology. Grasslands are rare, unique, life-sustaining ecosystems that support a great diversity of plants, animals and insects. More than thirty percent (30%) of British Columbia's threatened or endangered species depend on grasslands for their survival. BC's grasslands represent less than one percent (1%) of the provincial land base and are one of Canada's most endangered ecosystems. There is a strong need to improve education and communication concerning grasslands related issues. In fact, ancient grasslands represent a much more endangered space in BC and across Canada than does ancient or old growth forests.

The only sure way to promote grassland stewardship and ensure the sustainability of our grasslands into the future is through educating the public and raising public awareness and appreciation for these ecosystems. There are many grasslands in the 70 Mile, Green Lake, Watch Lake area. Please pay attention and learn about what you can do to protect and preserve them.
