


Co-chairman's Report

Dear GLARA Members,

Welcome to the fall/winter GLARA newsletter and update on the 2015 GLARA AGM.

During the August AGM, the standing directors were re-elected and our financials were presented. GLARA is in sound financial condition and we are currently conserving our cash for expenditures on a habitat assessment study (which is explained below) and general operating costs.



Alan Boyd reported on the north side stilling well installation and we would like to send thanks to both Alan and the WLNGVFD for their assistance. This stilling well monitors Green Lake's water levels in an official capacity which the government discontinued a number of years ago. We feel that this, and water quality are two of the primary concerns residents have with respect to our enjoyment of the area.

Marie Kuyek reported on the lake water quality which continues with a clean bill of health. Government funding for water quality monitoring remains very limited and so it is on the resident's shoulders to carry the vigilance of our habitat. This is especially important work as we have waterbodies that have very restricted inflows and outflows and hence biological and/or chemical change can develop rapidly.

On the subject of resident vigilance, we are becoming increasingly aware of the invasive species epidemic that is sweeping across North America. In the Green Lake/Watch Lake area we have had the good fortune that our area is not aquatically affected. Good fortunes are the key words as several lakes surrounding us have been impacted. Control or containment is very difficult once the species have established in the system.



In September, GLARA members attended an invasive species workshop in Lac La Hache. Not being a biologist and relatively unaware of the issue, I was amazed at the size, dimension and impact of the invasive species problem in Canada and it's steady march westward into BC. Several lakes in BC have been impacted to the point of recreational loss and property value depreciation. I implore residents to go to the website www.bcinvasives.ca and become aware of certain aquatic and terrestrial invasive species. You will then be able to help us identify and report these species in their early stages so that remedial action can be taken in a timely manner.

Last year we agreed that a new mandate for GLARA would be to complete a professional environmental assessment for the GL/WL OCP district and identify areas where we could participate championing or participating in habitat improvement. We have received a cost quotation that we believe is reasonable but it would impact our treasury rather significantly. With the help of GLARA directors, we have submitted proposals for grant assistance and I am pleased to announce that the TNRD has offered to cover approximately 35% of the costs. A special thanks to Sally Watson, our TNRD area director, for her guidance. We have also submitted a grant application to the CRD asking for matching funds to the TNRD grant and this will be determined by the CRD committee in January, 2016. GLARA will contribute the balance of required funds if the CRD approves the grant.

We would also like to thank the Provincial government for keeping the parks and sanistations open beyond Labour Day. This is much appreciated by residents and visitors during the fall, which is one of our most beautiful times of year.



We encourage your participation and suggestions at all times. Roy Allan, who manages our website www.glara.ca is continually asking for input, so please help us keep him happy!

Watch Lake - North Green Lake VFD GLARA Newsletter Report

In spite of a remarkably dry few months, the Northside was free of any major fires this past summer and it is a credit to our residents and visitors who respected the campfire and fireworks bans. There were three lightning strikes that could have turned quite serious had the crews not been able to respond rapidly. The first two fires were close to Watch Lake and, although off-road, they were both suppressed quickly and without incident. We were pleased that the water supply from the dry hydrants played an important role in providing a quick and reliable source of water for the firefighters in containing these blazes.



The third strike could have been far more serious, but the smoke was seen and reported by residents on the Southside who said it appeared to be somewhere behind the Flying U Ranch. It turned out to be in the Graham Lakes area on the fir ridge north of Farmer's Bull Pasture. Using their own quads and motorcycles, the firefighters cleared a trail in to the fire scene for the Forestry crew to do the mop-up.



Fortunately, a water bomber was available in Williams Lake and after four dumps of retardant the fire was out. Everyone on the south side had a first-hand display of fire suppression in action.

There were several call-outs to motor vehicle accidents throughout the summer. In one incident, the wife of one of the fighters sustained serious injuries. The other incidents were relatively minor and required only traffic control and clean-up of the road. Further traffic control was required during windstorms in the late summer and early fall when there were call-outs for trees on the hydro lines.

The Watch Lake area has long been plagued with a couple of radio dead spots. Numerous attempts have been made to correct the situation with little success. This summer, Chief Andy Palaniak and a couple of firefighters joined forces with the Southside Chief Peter McKie to clear some of the trees from around the radio tower on Mount Jack. This made some improvement, but there are still modifications to be made. Plans are in the works to move some of the equipment at Hall #1 to see if that works.

Recently the North and Southside departments, with members from 70 Mile joining them, have combined some of their Saturday training sessions to meet the requirements of the Structure Firefighters Competency as established by the Office of the Fire Commissioner.

As winter approaches it's time to check-out the woodstove and make sure it is safe to use for another cold season. Be sure the chimney is cleaned also, before the roof gets too slippery. The night we

turned the clocks back was when we were supposed to change the batteries in the smoke detector. If you didn't get it done then, please do it now. Let's all enjoy a safe and fire-free winter.

There are four sources of local information right here on our own information backroad. The Green Lake Snowmobile Club http://greenlakesnowmobileclub.ca has a very interesting site highlighting winter activities with important news items and announcements added throughout the rest of the year. The Green Lake Area Ratepayers Association site http://www.glara.ca covers year-round local interest news and events with links to many area services. Last year they held a photo contest highlighting the many activities that residents and visitors alike enjoy throughout the year. During the winter months there is also a weekly snow and ice report. Fire Safety information and department activities of the South Green Lake Volunteer Fire Department are found on their site http://southgreenlakevfd.ca and during the summer months this is a good source for the Kamloops area fire restrictions and campfire bans. Since the north side of the lake is in the Cariboo area, the Watch Lake — North Green Lake Volunteer Fire Department site http://www.wlnglfiredept.org may post fire restrictions that apply only in their area. Like the south side this site covers a wealth of fire prevention and safety articles as well as locally important fire department news.

The web master for the north side VFD tracks the usage and location of the people accessing their site and publishes a summary of his findings in the summer and winter newsletters. It is interesting to note that in its five years of operation the "hits" on this site have grown to over 1000 per month and that many of them come from as far away as Russia and Saudi Arabia.

While you are perusing the local web sites to see what is of interest, remember the latest best seller you heard about on CBC is only a click away at Amazon. And, the Canadian Tire on line sale flyer just came out or how about that new sled on eBay? Just like downtown.

We have a fire ground command structure to ensure all firefighters follow our operational guidelines and we all return from an incident with everyone safe back at the Fire Hall. Without this commitment from all the firefighters we would be unable to meet this objective.

NEED AN ADDRESS SIGN?

In an emergency when every second counts, firefighters, police or medical emergency services could lose critical time if they cannot locate your home. Despite recent advances in technology and improvements in our 911 emergency dispatch system, there is a marked difference for emergency personnel in being directed to an address and actually locating the residence. In an emergency, time lost trying to locate the correct driveway can have a tragic result.

Address signs posted in a uniform position, with highly visible reflective properties which allow the appropriate emergency response team to find you as quickly as possible. Signs that are not reflective or right beside the road may not be seen, especially at night or in bad weather conditions. We have the opportunity to again supply these signs for the reasonable price of \$20.00 each for a single sign (taxes are included). The signs measure 8" high x 16" wide and are made of engineer-grade aluminum with 5" black numbers on a white, highly reflective background. These signs are clearly visible in the daytime and at night, as well as during adverse weather conditions and they are approved by our Fire Departments. Invasive Species Workshop

Newsletter content for several issues now has featured information concerned with an urgent issue related to land based (terrestrials) and water borne plant species. As a result of information sharing with the BC Invasives Species Council, GLARA was approached late this summer with an invitation to have a workshop sponsored in our region. This offer was music to our ears. When did the Council intend on scheduling the event? As soon as possible!

In mid-September, a day long workshop was hosted at Lac La Hache. My take away was the seriousness of the threat to our precious lakes from the introduction of invasive species. Secondly, faces were put to names and encouragement not only from the Council's

commitment, but the local interest from 100 Mile House through Highway 24 to obtain further education for residents living by water. I am confident, from this workshop experience, that GLARA can expect to see additional support from the Council in 2016 to heighten the efforts not only to prevent the loss of government to act more responsibly and proactively on the invasives file.

I think for me it was interesting to see what is of focus in the world of invasive species and what is being done about it. However, I'd say my biggest takeaway was that a number of the species have been intentionally introduced for human enjoyment (i.e. bass, yellow flag iris, etc.), and that this is largely based on the fact that people do not understand the implications of doing so. To me, that really stressed the importance of educating people on how devastating invasives can be if they're in the wrong place.
