Nature brought into the classroom for two Ottawa schools

When there are barriers to bringing students to the lake, you need to find a way to bring the lake to them. This was the case for Watersheds Canada and its second year of delivering classroom programming for elementary students at two Ottawa schools, W.E. Gowling Public School and Carleton Heights Public School. Eight classes in total, reaching over 170 students and teachers, received curriculum-linked units on growth and changes in animals and plants.

New feature highlights the plight of shoreland health in the wake of increased development

This summer, Chloe Lajoie, our Natural Edge Program Manager, was featured in the Ontario Nature quarterly magazine discussing the importance of shoreland vegetated buffers. Landowners often think they are doing what is best by keeping the grass on their

property trim, but this is actually harmful to their shoreline and the lake as a whole. Over 90 percent of aquatic life will use this shoreland area (the riparian zone) at some point in their lifetime so a natural shoreline is best for them.



Protect your freshwater by restoring a natural shoreline using native trees, shrubs, and wildflowers with the Natural Edge program! Having a natural shoreline creates habitat for wildlife like frogs, turtles, and birds. Native species of plants will help stabilize the soil and keep a shoreline intact while also filtering out excess nutrients and toxins before they enter the waterway.
