

Explore Gold Rush history and paddle on glacier-fed lakes, backdropped by snow-covered mountain ridges.



History on The Gold Rush Trail: Celebrating Black History Month...

Black pioneers played an integral part in BC's Gold Rush, although not much history has been preserved. The Barkerville Archives shows that mining licenses for a dozen Black men and one woman, Rebecca Gibbs were issued from 1862 to 1871, while throughout BC's gold rush, a variety of black explorers found their fortune and even formed all-black-owned mining companies.
